Nestled in the foothills of the Himalayas lies the city of Pokhara, home to thousands of hard working people. But beneath the surface of this bustling, metropolitan area lies a hidden story-a darker side. One in which women and children carry the mental and physical scars left behind by human trafficking.

Our established Field Partner, 3 Angels Nepal, is working on the frontlines of this trafficking hotspot, rescuing and rehabilitating these women and children.

The Pokhara Project is a sustainable building development designed to increase the capacity and impact of their established antihuman trafficking work.

It will include a self-funding school, women's safe haven, vulnerable children's homes, a community medical centre and vocational training facilities, all designed to bring new life and hope back into the lives of those who have been trafficked or are at risk of trafficking.

Construction of the new facilities will begin once funding targets have been reached—and your generosity will take us a critical step towards achieving this important goal.



Imagine a World

Imagine a world where children are snatched from their homes or sold by their parents—left to fend for themselves and vulnerable to the criminal gangs who make false promises to trap their innocent souls.

Imagine a world where women are enticed into marriage, only to find themselves enslaved in the sex industry where violence and blackmail are used to prevent their escape.

It is almost impossible to imagine, yet this is the unthinkable reality for millions of people worldwide. Women, men, and children–exploited for profit. The scenarios look different based on a person's geography, sex, age, and physical abilities, but the result is always the same—a loss of freedom, a life of slavery.

Globally, there are nearly 50 million¹ people living as modern day slaves—this equates to twice the Australian population.

What is Human Trafficking?

Human trafficking feeds modern slavery.

It is the recruitment, movement and exploitation of people for profit, and is fuelled by poverty and instability.

As a person's desperation to survive in a world of increasing unrest and insecurity increases, so does their vulnerability to the tricks and schemes of human trafficking.

In Nepal there were an estimated 97,000² victims of modern slavery in 2021.

Girls and women from rural areas with limited economic opportunities are most vulnerable to the tricks of traffickers, and the 1700km open border between Nepal and India means more people are being trafficked out of Pokhara than ever before.



Untold Story

[Content trigger warning: child exploitation, trafficking and sexual abuse]

Tika's* story is a tale of two halves—one of unthinkable heartbreak, abuse and loss—and another filled with love and hope.

Before the tender age of 10 she had been exposed to domestic violence, child labour, homlessness, sexual abuse and human trafficking. She was forced to endure unspeakable hardship and her story makes for uncomfortable reading, but we urge you to hear her voice.

It all started when her father began drinking. There was a time before this when Tika was happy, when her parents laughed and her four sisters had a carefree childhood. But with the alcohol came violence, debt and deprivation.

Her parents would get so drunk the girls were forced to fend for themselves, and in the evenings they would cower in the shadows as the arguments grew more and more physical, or their father would pick which daughter to abuse.

When Tika was seven years old he walked out, leaving behind a large debt and a family struggling to survive. Her mother sold everything they owned to try and feed her girls, and sent Tika to live with an uncle in the hope he could offer her a better life, but he just made her work long hours looking after the animals and doing housework.

In desperation her mum turned to prostitution in a bid to survive.

And it wasn't just her own body she exploited for profit-shockingly she took Tika's older sister to the hotels and forced her too into a life of sex work.

It was a year before Tika returned to live with her mum and sisters in a bus shelter of a busy town. By the age of nine she had been forced even further into child labour, sieving sand from the river and carrying it to building sites, where she was paid just five cents a bucket. On other days she begged for money or stole food offerings from temples—anything to get food for her two younger sisters, aged just six and four.

Tika will never forget the day her mother drove up to the bus shelter and snatched away her two younger sisters—girls she had cared for like they were her own. The youngster was grief stricken.

She later discovered her six-year-old sister was sold to a hotel to pay the \$160 drinking debt her father had accrued. Here she was forced to wash dishes, clean the rooms,



work in the kitchen and was sexually abused by the guests. Her four-year-old sister was sold for \$270—money her father used to pay for his continuing alcohol addiction. She has not been seen since.

Utterly alone and completely afraid, Tika walked the streets in a daze. She found herself at the hotel where her older sister was working as a prostitute, and was about to be sold into a life of slavery when she was rescued by 3 Angels Nepal.

Tika was just 10 years old when she arrived at the women's safe haven. Her trauma was so extreme she barely spoke or ate. It took years before the depression and suicidal thoughts lifted and Tika was able to go to school, where she took pride in the fact she never dropped below second in her class for any subject.

The past still haunts her, but she is using her experiences to shape the future for other trafficked women. The 22 year old is now working as an assistant manager, studying at law school, and supporting two of her sisters and two nieces. On completion of her studies she hopes to give legal advice to other women.

"I can help women like me have a dignified, safe, life free from trafficking," she said.

3 Angels Nepal

THE POKHARA **PROJECT**

The Pokhara Project is a sustainable building development designed to increase the capacity and impact of established anti-human trafficking work in Nepal.

Nestled on the banks of the Seti River lie nine acres of land purchased by Give Freedom to provide a future home for 3 Angels Nepal. Our collective vision is to transform these fields into foundations of hope by building an earthquake-proof, environmentally sustainable centre.

It will include a women's safe haven, community medical centre, a self-funding school, vocational training facilities and vulnerable children's homes.

There will be clean drinking water, safe toilet facilities and 24 hour security. It will be a place for those rescued from trafficking to begin healing from the deep trauma of their past.

The Pokhara Project and its land is not owned by any individual entity and is legally protected to be used indefinitely for its intended purpose. This means, should 3 Angels Nepal cease as a charity or should The Pokhara Project be taken on by a new charity, the facility can only be utilised for education—such as schooling, vocational training, awareness programs—and all the buildings used for their original, intended purpose.

Built to Last

The Pokhara Project addresses the direct need for 3 Angels Nepal to own their own home and become sustainable.

For years they have run their rescue and restoration programs from poorly built, rented buildings which require costly maintenance, particularly after the damaging monsoon rains. These buildings have become outdated and outgrown, meaning 3 Angels Nepal continue to be reliant on the generosity of donors to keep them going. While they remain in these buildings, their dreams of self-sufficiency remain just that—dreams.

So, The Pokhara Project has been engineered to fit this brief. It will use the best, most cost-effective materials available, be able to withstand earthquakes and intense weather conditions, and boast energy saving eco-credentials.

Dotted lines represent future expansion of the development site to accommodate the predicted growth of 3 Angels Nepal. Solid lines will be constructed as part of The Pokhara Project.

True North Architects was engaged by Give Freedom to assist with master planning the Pokhara Project for 3 Angels Nepal. Considerable consultation with 3 Angels Nepal and Give Freedom was required to establish the nuts and bolts of the brief.

From visiting the cramped conditions in the existing school facilities, it was obvious that space was a primary need, but so too was thermal comfort. Another obvious need for the project was low maintenance materials to reduce the cost burden to the school. Due to the nature of the school, security was also a high priority. Reinforced concrete will be used for the post and beam structural frame, primarily for seismic reasons but also because it is the most entrenched and endemic method of construction, and therefore the most cost effective.

The Pokhara Project will deliver a self-sustaining vehicle that reduces maintenance and running costs, and allows 3 Angels Nepal to invest their time and funds into the core purpose of caring for and educating the students.

Locally supplied bricks will be employed for external and internal walls. The local clay used to produce these are a beautiful ochre colour and being locally produced, are cost effective. Both brickwork and concrete are dense materials and therefore have a high thermal mass, which allows them to act like a thermal battery and absorb and reradiate heat. When utilised properly through passive solar techniques, these materials will help maintain comfortable conditions for the teachers and students all year round.

Education

Education provides choices—it can break the cycle of poverty which in turn helps to reduce inequality.

The new 3 Angels Nepal school campus will be a safe place for children to learn, upskill and play—a place where they will gain the skills and knowledge they need to thrive.

Classrooms will create space for hundreds of children, from preschool to Year 12, to attend lessons six days a week. Students will be a mix of previously trafficked children, those at risk of being trafficked, and fee-paying children from the surrounding community.

The intentional blend of backgrounds will help break down damaging caste barriers, bringing children together as friends, and help create a generation free from prejudice and discrimination.

The Pokhara Project will include the construction of new vulnerable children's homes for girls and boys who have been rescued from trafficking, or who need protection from high-risk situations.

Overseen by qualified carers, the homes will be a refuge where children can form lifelong friendships, gain a sense of belonging—and have the freedom to simply be kids, free from the threat of trafficking.

They will provide a place where they can nurture their curiosity through formal schooling and grow healthy and strong with holistic health support.

Women

Imagine a world where women are safe. Where they are not exploited or abused, where they have the opportunity to learn and work.

The majority of human trafficking victims are young girls and women. Tricked or abducted, they are sold into prostitution, forced into marriage or to beg on the streets.

If they are rescued, many face the further challenge of stigma. The negative connotations attached to prostitution and the sex industry means they can be shunned by their family and friends. They are alone, with no support to rebuild their lives.

The Pokhara Project will include a new women's safe haven to provide trafficking survivors with critical healthcare, counselling, vocational training, and a strong supportive community as they begin the process of recovering from extreme trauma.

It will restore precious freedom to hundreds of women and empower them to live a life free from the predatory tactics of traffickers.

Health

Imagine a world where people are healthy, where they have access to medicines and trained medical professionals if they get sick, where preventative measures give them a healthy start in life.

When women and children arrive at the haven and homes, they are frequently in a poor state of health. Many have been forced to live in dire conditions, with very little nutritional food to eat. This leaves them vulnerable to infections and disease.

Stigma attached to them as victims of sexual exploitation, compounds their healing as many doctors refuse to treat them. Delays in testing, diagnosis and treatment, have significant detrimental effects on these already vulnerable women and children.

With your help, the medical centre included in The Pokhara Project will address this need and restore the health of the women and children. It will also be a flexible community space where medics can run programs for the local community who currently have to travel hours to see a doctor.

Imagine a world where children sleep safely in their beds, where they can walk to school without the fear of capture, where women are not used as commodities in the global human trafficking industry.

Rescued women and children continue to face threats of violence and abduction even once inside the four walls of the haven and children's homes.

Their freedom to move around is restricted as traffickers watch over the homes and prey on their vulnerabilities.

The Pokhara Project addresses the need to protect all those working for and in the care of 3 Angels Nepal. There will be a dedicated guard house, staffed 24 hours a day to monitor the movements on and off the site. CCTV will be installed, along with a retaining perimeter wall, to keep those inside safe and to deter potential traffickers from entering.
